

From the Pastor's Pen...



Living and Loving in the Way of Jesus with the Great Commandment -

As I described in last month's newsletter, the Shema/Great Commandment reveals that the meaning of life is to love God. Next to this, Jesus says, we must love our neighbor as we love ourselves. It's just that simple. (And that difficult.) The Shema/Great Commandment goes on to reveal that there are four particular ways we are able to love God; with all our **heart**, with all our **soul**, with all our **mind**, and with all our **strength**. (MARK 12:28-30)

These words represent four major expressions of what it means to be a human being, urging us to devote each to God and God's desire for creation. When we love we are loved, we are filled up, we experience peace, gratitude and joy. In the coming year, we will seek to lift up ways we may grow into loving God, ourselves and our neighbor on a deeper level. In this month's letter, I will highlight some ways I see the Spirit of Love at work in the life of Scandian Grove in the past month and month to come...

HEART.

This means to love God from the center of our being, the place where we embody our values and that leads us into particular decisions and action. It is about our vocation, or more literally our calling.

Our hearts and souls have been and are being stretched with compassion for those who have lost loved ones too soon and for those living with various forms and stages of cancer in our community. In such times we recognize how interdependent we are and that when one member of the body hurts, we all feel it. Karin Pauly was with us at the end of August to talk about the joys and struggles of caregivers. We had an encouraging conversation and I was grateful for how so many of you shared about your experiences caring for parents, spouses and yourselves in the midst of what can often be an emotional roller-coaster. I am grateful for your support as I have been helping my parents transition from one way of life to another. I'm also grateful for those of you who have invited me into your lives, homes and stories of grief. It is a privilege to be with you in such holy work.

SOUL.

This means to love God with our whole spirit, that place from which we have genuine, intimate relationships with God and with others, ways that allow us to be truly free to love deeply.

As some of you know I have been trained and certified as an Intentional Interim Pastor and an End of Life Doula. (Doula is a Greek word for servant.) I will be sharing some of my learning with the pastors of our conference in October about walking beside people as they approach the end of their lives. I also share this learning with Scandian Grove in small and big ways through sermons and with individual visits.

I have been especially equipped by the Holy Spirit to guide people through life's transitions – most of which include some form of loss, grief and joy. If you are interested in taking a deeper look at your life and God's purpose for you, we can arrange times to visit to complete a vision map for your life that includes patiently discovering and listening to your hopes and fears for all of life's transitions. I am here for you, but you need to take the first step and call or e-mail me.

MIND.

This means to love God with the center of our understanding and worldview - recognizing that our way of seeing and responding to the world is very often flawed or skewed due to influence of our culture's limited point of view. The love of God and others is to be the focus of our thoughts.

At the end of September we learned from Nancy Altmann a bit about the Minnesota Council of Churches and their work with refugees, asylees, and immigrants. In October we will use our minds

to dive into scripture a bit deeper at Scandian Grove. The first Sunday we will have coffee and Bible Talk following worship. The fourth Sunday it's bring your Bible to worship Sunday! We will celebrate the treasure of the Bible and children, youth **and** adults will be gifted with Bibles that Sunday. (Remember each week to check the Scandian Grove Facebook page for a Bible Project Video and Bible reading suggestions.)

We are grateful that Bishop Jon Anderson will be with us on Sunday, October 20. Bishop Jon will preach at our worship service and then lead us in conversation following the service. We are looking for volunteers to provide and serve refreshments following the worship service that Sunday.

STRENGTH.

This means to love with all our physical being. God gifts us with flesh and blood and takes them on himself in the incarnation of Jesus the Christ. Therefore, we believe that what we do with this stuff matters. We can love God and others with our body and with all the energy we have within us. To love with our strength gives us a sense of being fully present in the moment, awake to our surroundings and sensations, and in tune with the Spirit within each of us.

In the past month at Scandian Grove we have had the opportunity to gather together inside and outside. How good it feels to worship not only within our sanctuary but also in the sanctuary of God's creation. Once again we enjoyed the opportunity to partner with our friends at Trinity/St. Paul's at the Tractor Roll-in and savor the sights of harvest and shade of large Ash and Hackberry trees on a warm, sunny morning. Thank you to those who provided the tasty treats before the service.

We are grateful to have had some warm September days to encourage the corn and our spirits after a cold, wet spring. Walking outside on days like this nurtures my physical health and spiritual growth as well. Loving God with my strength, with my physical senses, my muscles and ligaments stretched and flexed makes me more receptive to God's unconditional love and acceptance. Kelsey Anderson told me at the Nicollet County Fair that her favorite smell is "spring soil," and suggested someone should bottle that smell or make a candle scent for it. I know many of us appreciate the smells of fall in a similar way. Be sure to create time in your day or week to appreciate the simple pleasures of life loving God, yourself and your neighbor can be as simple as talking a walk outside. Open your imagination to consider how the Holy Spirit is walking with you and filling you up with the breath of life.

Join me and others for Stretch and Pray. We sit in chairs and follow simple yoga videos (you can be on the floor if you prefer.) We quiet our minds and enjoy just being together without any pressure or competition. I hope to see you. The same goes for walking at 11:30 on Sunday mornings. We just walk at a gentle pace for about 30 minutes around the Norseland area. There is no agenda or pressure. You can talk or simply listen. The more the merrier!

Financial Secretary's Report

A report was given by Doug. Theresa made a motion to accept the report with no additions or corrections. The motion was seconded by Wallace. The motion carried.

Treasurers Report

A report was given by Wallace. It was noted that the \$3,000 credit line was used to cover all expenses. Doug made a motion to accept the report with no additions or corrections. The motion was seconded by Dave. The motion carried.

Old Business

- A new projector is needed for use in the fellowship hall for educational purposes, and in the sanctuary before or during church services. Theresa made a motion to purchase a new projector with a price cap of \$200; Solveig seconded the motion; the motion carried.
- We reviewed LP bids for the winter of 2019/20 from Crystal Valley (\$1.01), Kohler (\$1.02) and UFC (\$1.05). Dave made a motion to go with Crystal Valley; Solveig seconded the motion; the motion carried.
- Terry Pankratz had given the word that the parsonage is finished with all the projects that had been decided on. Upon touring the building, the Council will look into having the building deep-cleaned before we decide what next steps will be.
- The Loffler contract is signed and we will be receiving a new copier soon.
- A bid has been accepted from Todd Iverson to begin painting in the inside of the church building. Priority painting projects will be: Pastor Shelly's office, the narthex, the library and the bathrooms.
- Tim and Anna Lokensgard recently hired a cleaning of the limestone on the front of the building. It looks so much better! Thank you, Tim and Anna!
- A committee has been formed to look into getting additional heavy-duty chairs with armrests for the sanctuary. A memorial for this purpose was given in memory of Paul Bjorklund. The committee is Theresa, Shelly, Bruce and Solveig.

New Business

- A request was made to Scandian Grove by Norseland Lutheran Church that we allow them to use our church in the event of a funeral during their upcoming sanctuary renovation. The renovation

begins October 1, with proposed completion by December 1. Solveig made a motion that we make our building available to them; Theresa seconded the motion; the motion carried unanimously. They are aware of our Fall Supper event.

- It was decided that Sunday, September 22 would be our Fall Church-Cleaning Day, immediately following the service and a potluck dinner. The Council will serve soup and beverages. Church members are asked to bring sandwiches and desserts. There will be no Adult Forum or walk that day.

The “Go” Of Relationship

“Whoever compels you, to go one mile, go with him two.”

MATTHEW 5:41


OUR LORD’S TEACHING CAN BE SUMMED UP IN THIS: the relationship that He demands for us is an impossible one unless He has done a super-natural work in us. Jesus Christ demands that His disciple does not allow even the slightest trace of resentment in his heart when faced with tyranny and injustice. No amount of enthusiasm will ever stand up to the strain that Jesus Christ will put upon His servant. Only one thing will bear the strain, and that is a personal relationship with Jesus Christ Himself—a relationship that has been examined, purified, and tested until only one purpose remains and I can truly say, “I am hear for God to send me where He will.” Everything else may become blurred, but this relationship with Jesus Christ must never be.

The Sermon on the Mount is not some unattainable goal; it is a statement of what will happen in me when Jesus Christ has changed my nature by putting His own nature in me. Jesus Christ is the only One who can fulfill the Sermon on the Mount.

If we are to be disciples of Jesus, we must be made disciples supernaturally. And as long as we consciously maintain the determined purpose to be His disciples, we can be sure that we are not disciples. Jesus says, “You did not choose Me, but I chose you . . .” (JOHN 15:16). That is the way the grace of God begins. It is a constraint we can never escape; we can disobey it, but we can never start it or produce it ourselves. We are drawn to God by a work of His supernatural grace, and we can never trace back to find where the work began. Our Lord’s making of a disciple is supernatural. He does not build on any natural capacity of ours at all. God does not ask us to do the things that are naturally easy for us—He only asks us to do the things that we are perfectly fit to do through His grace, and that is where the cross we must bear will always come.

Spring has come at last to the Scandian Grove community. Today the temperature was up to 80 for a while. In spite of a few snowbanks that still remain in shady spots, it really seems like spring. The frogs are croaking in the ponds, the meadowlarks are singing, the robins are building nests, and pulling worms out of the ground.

No doubt you have heard something about the winter we had. In the latter part of February we had visions of an early spring. Then on February 28 we had a blizzard, and during the month of March it was one big snowstorm after the other. Reports indicate the snowfall this winter was the heaviest on record, more than 90 inches. Our church services were cancelled on March 4 and March 18, and also several of our midweek Lenten services. The roads were really blocked several times. After being snowed in for a long time we had fine weather on Easter Sunday, March 25, and the roads were open for most of our church members, and it felt good to be at church again. Some of our older members say they can never remember a winter when so many church services were cancelled because of snow.

Perhaps you also have heard about the floods when the Minnesota River went over its banks. North Mankato was hard hit. All the residents had to leave on April 7 and 8 and only a few have been able to move back yet. Highway 169 at the south end of St. Peter was under water for several days, but was not seriously washed out. It is open for traffic again. At Le Sueur, in the curve before you come to the bridge, the highway was completely washed out. It will take a long time to rebuild it. Highway 99 along Spring Lake was washed out and is not open yet. The railroad was washed out south of the depot at St. Peter, and no trains could run from April 8 until the 24th. It is reported that they had some unusual excitement when they tried to haul corn from Cargill's plant with a team of horses. The horses ran away and got tangled up and almost drowned in the river.

The Brotherhood and the Luther League greet you from all your friends back home. We are sending you a "Service Men's Prayer Book." We hope you receive it and that it will serve as a constant reminder of your home church and the friends here.

We hope you will find time to write occasionally. We shall try to send a few lines as often as possible from the Brotherhood and the Luther League.

I come from a family of rock pickers. I'll have to admit to being a fully fledged Rock Hound as some would say. It's hard for me to ride in the car and drive by a pile of field rock that a farmer has collected over the years without feeling a strong urge to stop and dig through them. There were many springs that Dad would walk the south 80 picking up rocks that had eroded to the surface. On a few occasions he found a couple of arrow heads, as I remember, one perfect one and one with the tip broken off. You can't see them now, but he always said there were Indian burial mounds out there.

Ma had her garden in the old hog yard and as you can imagine it was prolific in growing lots of produce in that rich, fertile soil. It was also prolific with little rocks that she picked up throughout the summer as she hoed, watered and harvested that plot. She'd have these little piles of rocks laying sporadically all over the garden. I know she picked the piles up, but what she did with those rocks, I really don't know. But my guess would be that she put them on the driveway to fill any low spots.

Dad would bring his rocks home from the fields and throw them behind the old machine shed or out in the pasture where the water would wash gullies in the hillside.

There were many summer days that I spent climbing the rock piles at home investigating the new arrivals. There were rocks from the size of your fist to ones as big as a large doghouse. Each one had its own distinct markings, colors and feel to them. Some sparkled like they had gold and diamonds imbedded in them. Some looked like caramel and were as smooth as caramel. I think the ones that fascinated me the most were the ones that had a totally different looking band going right through the middle of them. And you know, not one of them had some blue or green color to it. Why do you think that is?

To this day, I pick rocks everywhere I go. Sometimes our vacations are planned around picking rocks. My husband isn't as fond of picking rocks as I am but he indulges me often. So you ask, what do I do with all my hunted treasures? Well, I landscape with many of the big ones and do craft projects with the little ones. As I look through my stash trying to find the perfect fit or the right color or texture, I think about how different each one is, just like people are so different from one another. I just marvel at the great amount of creativity God had in creating each one and its characteristics. It's the same with people and their individual colors, talents, shapes and characteristics. Just think if you sat down and listed every characteristic a human could have and then figured out the different combinations that could come out of all those characteristics. I can't even fathom that concept let alone do the same with a pile of rocks and their characteristics. God created amazing rocks but He created even more amazing people. Everyone is unique in their own way, a one of a kind and irreplaceable; not like an old rock. Psalm 139:14 sums it up nicely! *We are fearfully and wonderfully made; Your works are wonderful, I know that full well.*


